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Executive Summary (Administration Report)

The Network

The Global Water Partnership (GWP) is a multi-stakeholder network and organisation founded in 1996 that brings together governments, civil society organizations, the private sector, and other stakeholders to address water-related challenges. Adhering to the <u>Dublin-Rio Principles</u>, GWP is dedicated to working with countries towards the equitable, sustainable, and efficient management of water resources.



GWP encompasses over 2,800 registered partner organisations. The GWP Network of 13 Regional, 77 Country Water Partnerships (CWPs) and its Intergovernmental Organisation, convenes and brokers coordinated action by government and nongovernment actors. A long-time advocate of Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM), GWP's vision for a water secure world is successfully pursued through its mission to support countries to manage water resources sustainably, enhance water security, and achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) that relate to water.

The 13 GWP Regional Water Partnerships are located in: Southern Africa, Eastern Africa, Central Africa, West Africa, the Mediterranean, Central and Eastern Europe, Caribbean, Central America, South America, Central Asia and the Caucasus, South Asia, Southeast Asia, and China.

Providing technical assistance, knowledge sharing, and capacity development services to its stakeholders, GWP's work is guided by its principles of collaboration, inclusiveness, and sustainability. It has developed tools and methodologies to support the implementation of IWRM, including the IWRM Action Hub, a global knowledge platform that supports actors to implement IWRM, share knowledge and expertise about their implementation experiences, and bring relevant stakeholders together to improve the way water is managed around the world.

The GWP Technical Committee (GWP TEC) supports the <u>GWP Strategy 2020-2025</u> through global strategic positioning of <u>Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM)</u> issues, partnership between public and private sectors, fostering innovation, and providing in-country support to GWP country and regional networks around the world. The GWP TEC provides guidance with regards to GWP's role in supporting climate-resilient water investments.



At the heart of all of its activities, workplans and strategies, GWP commits to the following values: inclusiveness, openness, transparency, accountability, respect, gender sensitivity, and solidarity.

The Organisation

GWP is supported by a global secretariat based in Stockholm - the Global Water Partnership Organisation (GWPO). Established in 2002 as a neutral intergovernmental organisation and possessing full legal personality under international law, GWPO is currently hosted by the Government of Sweden. The Executive Secretary of the GWP Network is also the Chief Executive Officer of the Organisation and the head of the Secretariat. The ES reports to the GWP Steering Committee (SC), which is headed by a Chair. The SC develops, steers and organises the work of the Organisation and guides the cooperation between the Partners within the Network. It also provides policy oversight through its main Subcommittees and approves the work programme and budget. The SC endeavours to achieve regional and gender balance representation amongst its ranks and each member serves in their personal capacity. The SC is appointed by and answerable to the Sponsoring Partners (SP), comprised of GWPO founding members. The SP is the ultimate decision-making body of the GWPO. GWPO was between 2019 and 2024 the administrative host of Cap-Net, UNDP's global network for capacity development in sustainable water management within the Global Water and Oceans Governance Support Programme.

GWPO is funded by a range of Financing Partners providing a mix of unrestricted and restricted funds.

During 2024, GWPO had a workforce of 24 FTE supported by unrestricted and restricted funds.

The GWP in Action 2024 is in development. Progress reviews for each year are published on the website and presents more information about GWP's worldwide activities.

The Strategy

As a global network, GWP emphasises a threefold strategy: We Learn, We Mobilise, and We Act.

-We Learn

We Learn focuses on developing the capacity to share knowledge and fostering a dynamic communications culture through i) capacity building, ii) peer-to-peer learning and knowledge exchange, iii) publications, and iv) social media.

In 2024, the GWP <u>Technical Committee</u> launched the AI Lab, starting with a global convening to explore the potential of artificial intelligence in accelerating water security. The strong response from the first webinar, along with follow-up interest from potential external partners, led the TEC to develop a three-part concept for the GWP TEC AI Lab: 1) A Community of Practice on AI and Water Governance; 2) A Hybrid Webinar Series on Selected Topics by Core Partners of the AI Lab; and 3) a "Lab" that will test and develop AI solutions for water governance issues in GWP regions and countries. The GWP TEC series of dialogues with the GWP Network continued, with four new dialogues convened.



The <u>IWRM Action Hub</u> grew to more than 3,600 registered users from 169 countries. This growth was largely driven by the strong interest in IWRM Tools and the new Communities of Practice launched in 2024: the WEFE4MED Community in the Mediterranean, and the 4 regional UNCCD's Communities of Learning and Practice on Drought Management. Two new features were added to the IWRM Action Hub in 2024: the Platforms Catalogue, a repository of knowledge and data platforms related to water management, and the integration with FAO Aqua Lex, one of the world's largest online repositories of national laws, regulations, and policies on food, agriculture and natural resources management.

-We Mobilise

We Mobilise focuses on enhancing the viability and effectiveness of GWP's Network by strengthening partnerships and partner organisations to catalyse change, enhance learning, and improve financial sustainability.

Highlights in 2024 include the collaboration with FAO on drought management knowledge development, with the Government of the Netherlands and Deltares on the Valuing Water initiative and with UNCDD on Communities of Practice. With regards to private sector engagement, at global level, During the Network Meeting of GWP Partners, nearly 300 members of the GWP Network came together virtually. This important event brought Partners from 91 countries to reflect on achievements and discuss the development of GWP's 2026-2030 Strategy. Ahead of the meeting, GWP Partners contributed valuable insights through several surveys designed to guide the development of GWP's upcoming strategy.

-We Act

We Act focuses on advancing effective governance, based on comprehensive and mutually supportive policies, institutions, partnerships, processes, and information-sharing. These efforts are typically implemented through i) global advocacy, ii) support to transboundary and regional organisations, iii) support to national governments, and iv) the facilitation of multi-stakeholder processes. Most of the activities that contribute to We Act are delivered through the thematic anchor areas, which highlighted results are presented below (see Areas of work).

Areas of Work

Advancing water solutions for the SDGs

In 2024, GWP supported the aggregation of country monitoring results to inform the <u>Progress on Implementation of Integrated Water Resources Management – 2024 Update</u> report, published by UN-Water and UNEP, and contributed to the writing of the document. At national level, under the leadership of the Ministry of Water of Tanzania and the Wami Ruvu Basin Water Board, GWP supported the development of a publication series on the value of water in Tanzania's economy. The report Valuing Water in Tanzania: (Re)assessing the Contribution of Water to the National Economy covers three important sectors for Tanzania's economy, namely agriculture, manufacturing and mining. The <u>Global Water Leadership (GWL)</u> Programme finalised in 2024, through which GWP supported 7 countries to develop Response Strategies policies and plans for enhancing national water and climate resilience.

Building climate resilience for water security

The African Union Multi-Country Programme to Accelerate Water and Climate Resilience Investments through the Africa Water Investment Programme (AU-AIP Multi-country GCF Readiness Project) was approved by the Green Climate Fund (GCF) in 2024. For a catalytic USD 6.2M, the project covers 15 countries and mainly focuses on the development of national Climate-Resilient Water Investment Programmes. In 2024, GWP successfully completed the implementation of its first set of GCF Readiness projects in Zambia, Somalia, Eswatini, and the Central African Republic. During the implementation of these projects, 10 GCF Concept Notes were developed for Sri Lanka, Somalia, Eswatini, and Central African Republic, in alignment with their GCF Country Programmes, which were submitted to the GCF. The



Drought Resilience +10 Conference was organised by GWP and WMO as part of the joint Integrated Drought Management Programme, which brought together nearly 1,000 experts, policymakers, and practitioners from 123 countries to assess the progress made in drought management over the past decade and discuss the way forward.

Facilitating transboundary water cooperation

In 2024, GWP supported 10 transboundary water management institutions and 9 regional organisations in advancing transboundary cooperation. Together with UNECE, GEF IW:LEARN, and other partners, GWP organised the *Pan-Africa Water Governance and International Water Law Training*. At national level, GWP assisted the Ministry of Water and Sanitation in Chad developing the strategy and implementation plan for the Water Convention, validated in 2024. The Governments of Mozambique, Malawi and Tanzania signed a Memorandum of Understanding for the Joint Management of the Ruvuma/Rovuma River Basin, a process closely supported by GWP.

Mainstreaming gender equality

GWP's work on incorporating of gender equality as part of the water governance processes continued in 2024. In Paraguay, GWP assisted the Ministry of Environment and Sustainable Development in developing indicators that emphasize equal opportunities between men and women in the measures included in the country's sectoral mitigation plans as part of a project funded by the NDC Partnership. In Sri Lanka, the Climate Smart Green Growth Strategy, developed under the GCF Readiness support implemented by GWP has considered gender in the formulation of potential pathways to reach the country's 2050 vision of climate-smart green growth. This is supported by a dedicated climate-smart green growth indicator that looks at gender.

Mobilising youth for water management

GWP continued its engagement with young people throughout 2024, recognising their vital role as both beneficiaries and active partners towards a water secure world. For example, in the Danube Basin, as part of the EU-funded DanuRELY project, GWP organised the Danube Youth Leadership Stakeholders Roundtable, bringing together youth and experts to tackle water challenges. In Honduras, young professionals from the Youth Water Network and WASH service providers were invited to participate in stakeholder consultations for the development of the Climate Change Law.

Working with the private sector

At the global level, in 2024 GWP convened the private sector water dialogue through a public-private sector roundtable on improving data for water management, sponsored by Heidelberg Materials. In the Central African Republic, GWP assisted the Ministry of Environment and Sustainable Development in the development of an Action Plan for Private Sector Engagement, validated in 2024, as part of the GCF Readiness programme. GWP also designed a project for Microsoft Corporation to contribute to the achievement of the company's water replenishment targets, to be implemented in Athens, Greece.

GWP and UNDP Cap-Net collaboration

Cap-Net (which is hosted by GWPO) and the broader GWP Network have collaborated for several years in capacity development for sustainable water resources management and to design and implement needs-based knowledge for water professionals around the world. In 2024, GWP and Cap-Net worked together to build capacity and promote peer-to-peer learning on gender inclusion in IWRM by maintaining the joint Community of Practice and hosting a new edition of the virtual course on the Cap-Net virtual campus.



Partners

As noted above, the Global Water Partnership is the combination of an intergovernmental organization (GWPO) and a broad, multistakeholder action network. The entire GWP Network is dedicated to working with countries towards the equitable, sustainable, and efficient management of water resources. As a long-time advocate for Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM), a process that promotes the coordinated development and management of water, land, and related resources to maximise economic and social welfare equitably without compromising the sustainability of vital ecosystems. GWP draws on implementation experience at the local, national and regional levels and make links across our Network as well as to global development agendas.

The GWP Network is open to all organisations that recognise the principles of IWRM endorsed by the Network. That Network includes states, government institutions at all levels, non-governmental organisations, academic and research institutions, private companies, and service providers in the public sector. GWP's diverse and inclusive Network is a platform for policy dialogue and bottom-up development of action plans and programmes, providing a voice for communities on water management.

At the end of 2024, the Network had 13 Regional Water Partnerships, 77 Country Water Partnerships, and over 2,800 Partners.

All GWP Partners are published on the website.

Income provided to GWP through GWPO

In 2024, 22 Financing Partners provided financial support to GWP through grants made to GWPO. These Financing Partners included Austria, China, Cyprus Institute, DHI/UNEP, European Union, FAO, FCDO, Green Climate Fund, GRIPS, Heidelberg, Malta, NDC, Netherlands, Sweden, UCAR, UNCCD, UNDP, UNESCO, WMO, US Dept of State, and World Resources Institute. Together, these partners contributed a total of about €7.7 million, of which €7.2 million was restricted funding tied to specific activities, including about €0.6 million for Cap-Net.

Exposure to liquidity and currency risks

Liquidity is a risk area for GWPO as a donor-funded organisation. Disbursement for unrestricted funding is made during the second half of the year. Restricted funding disbursements are normally made ahead of activities. To bridge any gaps in funding, GWPO has access to a credit facility with Nordea AB, currently SEK9 million.

Disbursements to GWPO are made in SEK, USD, Euro, and GBP. The risk related to fluctuations in currency value is mitigated through the aim to match donor currencies with payments in the same currency.



Environmental and staff considerations

All human activity uses environmental resources and so do the activities of GWPO. GWPO is committed to carefully manage, limit and, where possible mitigate the impact of our activities that have a direct negative environmental impact. This includes activities such as face-to-face events and transportation (especially air travel). We hold virtual meetings whenever possible and select the most environmentally friendly means of transportation.

GWPO has well developed Human Resources policies and procedures, and the organisation is supported by an external Ombudsperson.

Significant events during 2024

On August 1st, 2023, a new Interim Executive Secretary was appointed externally (in consultation with the Financing Partners Group) with the specific mandate of stabilising and restructuring the Organisation until the selection and appointment of a new permanent Executive Secretary. In November 2023, the restructuring of the organisation was completed, and the changes were fully in effect by March 2024. The recruitment of the new permanent Executive Secretary and CEO was concluded in December 2023, with the appointment term beginning February 1st2024, and ending December 31st, 2024, due to early retirement. A new Executive Secretary and CEO was appointed February 1st, 2025.

In early 2023, the restructuring of the organisation forced GWPO to conclude some staff contracts. This development contributed to a series of negative press articles 2024.

Significant events during 2025

On May 7th, 2025, the Swedish Parliament approved the end of the Host Agreement between the Government of Sweden and the Global Water Partnership Organisation (GWPO), which has provided the framework for the location of the GWPO HQ in Stockholm. The Host Agreement provided GWPO and its staff with privileges and immunities under Swedish law. Sweden will also exit its membership with GWPO, as a Sponsoring Partner.

While this decision does not affect the legal identity of GWPO or the continuity of our operations, it is a significant institutional moment that warrants transparency and attention. The Cabinet of Sweden formally approved the parliamentary decision, and as notified by the Swedish Ministry of Foreign Affairs the Host Agreement will end May 22nd 2026. GWPO will continue its operations with Stockholm as the official HQ, including the current privileges and immunities provided for in our current Host Agreement with Sweden until May 22nd 2026.

Future developments and significant risks and uncertainties

At the beginning of 2024, GWPO inaugurated a process of reform whose purpose is to update and modernize the Organisation's formal structure and governance processes, which were originally codified by international agreement in 2002. This process will eventually include inviting new countries to join the Sponsoring Partners group of countries and multilateral organisations, planning for the eventual revision of governing statutes, developing a renewed global strategy for the period 2026-2030, and making operational adjustments that align with those reforms. These adjustments will include continuing the process of decentralize secretariat functions away from Stockholm transferring programmatic leadership to regional centres (a process which is already under way). The result is expected to be a stronger, more representative, and more efficient organization, better suited to address the changing landscape of global water security challenges and to meet the growing demand for implementation of water-related programming at large scale.

In alignment with this reform process, GWPO is also initiating a concerted fundraising and development strategy, termed the "Replenishment Campaign", intended to diversify and grow the organisation's sources of financial support.



As sources of unrestricted or "core" support decline, new sources of restricted, programmatic funding have become increasingly important, and GWPO is developing its capacity to deliver on programming contracted by international funding agencies.

Political changes and other changes of priority within the global funding community, which could lead to reduced funding availability for GWPO, is also an identified risk for the Organisation. GWPO is developing plans for adjusting the overall size of its global secretariat and placing more secretariat services in regions and countries with lower cost structures, as one strategy for mitigating that risk.

Notes

Accounting principles

The Annual Financial Report is prepared based on the principles of going concern and accrued accounting.

The Annual Financial Report is prepared based on the Annual Accounts Act and BFNAR 2012:1 Annual Report and Consolidated Financial Statement (K3) except for fixed assets. Fixed assets are recorded as cost when purchased. Fixed assets only contain items like office inventory and IT equipment. The amounts are immaterial to the Annual Financial Report and therefor recorded as cost when purchased.

Currencies

The GWPO accounting currency is Euro. The European Central Bank exchange rate at the balance date is used for all assets and liabilities.

Expenditures in other currencies than Euro are converted to EURO using the ECB daily rate. Transactional differences are calculated automatically by the ERP system and the corresponding entry i passed to the general ledger.

Income Statement

Income and expenditures are disclosed according to their functions.

<u>Income</u>

Income is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Unrestricted Funding Income consists of income to be used within the GWP Strategy and Work Plan. GWPO can allocate the income according to its priorities within the strategy targets.

Restricted Funding Income consists of income where specific requirements, programmatic and/or geographical, are set by the donor.

Contributions paid for Restricted Funding above the level of expenditures for the financial year are reported as advance payments and utilised for project activities during the following year.

In-kind contributions

In-kind contributions are, per Swedish accounting principles, not to be reported in the Income Statement.

Pension costs

Pension premiums, calculated as a percentage of the gross salary, are for most international staff deposited semi-annually at AMFIE (Association Mutualiste des Fonctionnaires des Organisations Intergouvernementales, Luxembourg).

Pension premiums for taxed staff, calculated as a percentage of the gross salary, are paid monthly to the insurance provider.

Leased assets

All lease agreements, regardless of whether they are financial or operating in nature, are accounted for as rental agreements (operating lease agreements).

The leasing fee is expensed over the full period of the lease on a linear basis.

GWPO rents office premises at Linnégatan 89A and the total rent for 2024 was €230,881. The rent for 2025 is estimated to € 141,000, and for the period 2026-30th June 2027 € 226,000. The rental agreement ends 30th June 2027.

GWPO has a lease agreement with Prodoc/Siemens for a printer/copy machine, at a cost of €3,695. Estimated cost for 2025 is €3,700 and for 2026 €1,000. The agreement expires 31st March 2026.



17 laptops were leased through an agreement with 3StepIT during 2024, at a total cost €8,890. Two leased laptops will be returned 2025. Estimated cost 2025 is €8,000. The lease agreement can be cancelled with a six months' notice period.

Fixed assets

GWPO records purchase of office and IT equipment as expenditures during the purchase year.

Receivables

Based on individual assessment, receivables are reported at the amounts which they are anticipated to be received.

Liabilities

Liabilities are reported at their nominal amounts.

Equity

GWPO keeps a Reserve Fund as restricted equity. The Reserve Fund may be used in the event of a sudden and unforeseen closedown of GWPO. The amount is approved by the GWPO Steering Committee in connection with the approval of the coming year's budget. The reserve fund shall be within the available equity.

SEK9m of the Reserve Fund is used as collateral for a credit line. The credit line was not used by 31st December 2024.

Cash flow statement

The statement is prepared in accordance with the indirect method. The cash flow only includes transactions which generated ingoing or outgoing payments.

GWPO is not registered for VAT. VAT is refunded by the Tax Authorities for some items like rent and office cost in accordance with Mervärdeskattelag 2023:200, chapter 10. Salary taxes are reimbursed through the Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

Note 26 Significant events 2025		

On May 7th 2025, the Swedish Parliament approved the end of the Host Agreement between the Government of Sweden and the Global Water Partnership Organisation (GWPO), which has provided the framework for the location of the GWPO HQ in Stockholm. The Host Agreement provided GWPO and its staff with privileges and immunities under Swedish law. Sweden will also exit its membership with GWPO, as a Sponsoring Partner.

While this decision does not affect the legal identity of GWPO or the continuity of our operations, it is a significant institutional moment that warrants transparency and attention. The Cabinet of Sweden formally approved the parliamentary decision, and as notified by the Swedish Ministry of Foreign Affairs the Host Agreement will end May 22nd 2026. GWPO will continue its operations with Stockholm as the official HQ, including the current privileges and immunities provided for in our current Host Agreement with Sweden until May 22nd 2026.

Locally Raised Income

GWP regions and countries raise funds independently to address local priorities. During 2024, €9,2 million (2023 €6,3) was raised by GWP regions or countries. In some cases, locally raised grants are categorised as globally raised because GWPO acts as fiscal sponsor and signs the agreement with the donor, but it is acknowledged that the region or country did the work to secure the funding and does the bulk of the project management. For example, the Drin Project, funded by UNDP, is a project initiated by GWP Mediterranean, but the contracts are signed and formally managed by GWPO. As noted in the 2023 Financial Report, these Locally Raised Funds are no longer included in the GWPO Financial Statement, however presented below to provide a sense of their regional distribution.

Report on the annual accounts

Opinions

We have audited the annual accounts of Global Water Partnership Organisation for the year 2024.

In our opinion, the annual accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Annual Accounts Act and present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Global Water Partnership Organisation as of 31 December 2024 and its financial performance and cash flow for the year then ended in accordance with the Annual Accounts Act. The statutory administration report is consistent with the other parts of the annual accounts.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISA) and generally accepted auditing standards in Sweden. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities* section. We are independent of Global Water Partnership Organisation in accordance with professional ethics for accountants in Sweden and have otherwise fulfilled our ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinions.

Other information than the annual accounts

This document also contains other information than the annual accounts and is found on pages 27-31. The Steering Committee and the Executive Secretary are responsible for this other information.

Our opinion on the annual accounts does not cover this other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion regarding this other information.

In connection with our audit of the annual accounts, our responsibility is to read the information identified above and consider whether the information is materially inconsistent with the annual accounts. In this procedure we also take into account our knowledge otherwise obtained in the audit and assess whether the information otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If we, based on the work performed concerning this information, conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of the Steering Committee and the Executive Secretary

The Steering Committee and the Executive Secretary are responsible for the preparation of the annual accounts and that they give a fair presentation in accordance with the Annual Accounts Act. The Steering Committee and the Executive Secretary are also responsible for such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of annual accounts that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the annual accounts, the Steering Committee and the Executive Secretary are responsible for the assessment of the company's ability to continue as a going concern. They disclose, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting. The going concern basis of accounting is however not applied if the Steering Committee and the Executive Secretary intend to liquidate the association, to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibility
